Astronaut Mike Fossum was the featured speaker at a Friends of Scouting Luncheon at the Jackson Street Event Center in Harlingen on June 4th. Fossum, a Valley native and Eagle Scout from troop 7 in McAllen, told



an audience of Scouting supporters and Scouts that his time in the Boy Scouts helped him prepare for the space program by teaching him about setting goals and working with others as a team. "Scouting showed me I can strive for excellence," Fossum said. "It taught me to serve others; that I can influence my community for the better."

Fossum has flown on two space shuttle missions, has conducted seven space walks, and has flown on a Russian Soyuz spacecraft. He was the commander of the International Space Station for almost six months. Video of his time on the international space station was a hit with the

luncheon audience. While circling the earth on the space station four years ago Fossum called Camp Perry via a video/audio link and spoke to Scouts. During his call from space he told Scouts that: "Camp Perry is one of my favorite places on earth."

Also speaking at the luncheon were Scouts Justin MacManus – Eagle Scout, Ali Halloum – Scout Troop 1701, Jerrey Guevara – Eagle Scout, Christopher Hinojosa – Eagle Scout. An adult attending the event told this reporter: "The Scouts were fantastic -- demonstrating confidence, purpose and mature thinking."

Fossum posed for pictures with many of the attendees and with all of the Scouts present. He presented new

Scout Executive Rudy Gonzalez with a Rio Grande Council strip patch which he carried with him to space, saying "this council strip has been in space and traveled more than 64 million miles."

The Luncheon Planning Committee chairman Frank Espinoza and co-chairs Ruthie Evers and Dr. Linda Burke led a team which included Scouts of Troop 1701, Chris and Anita Boswell, Shane Strubhart and Dr. Arturo Cavazos, and Nena Siller.

After college he taught elementary school and then as a junior high school physical education

teacher and coach. He spent many years as an Assistant Principal and Principal.

Richard was a Cub Scout from 1959-1962. Later in his life, like many fathers with young sons, he got involved in Scouting serving as committee member and Assistant Scout Master.

When he moved to the Valley he served as a Unit Commissioner and an Assistant Scout Master with Troop 68 in McAllen. Richard attended Wood Badge. He lived the Scout Oath and Scout Law, knew the value of Scouting, and tried to bring Scouting to all boys. Richard took to heart something Baden-Powell said, "Our aim is to give equal chances to all and to give the most help to the least fortunate."



The Rio Grande Council's NYLT, an intensive 5½ day, outdoor leadership training experience for troop youth leaders, was held during the second week of July at Camp Perry. Over 30 participants from troops across the council were led by a staff of 16 adult and boy leaders in a curriculum which equips youth with those skills essential for

successful leadership. The principle function of NYLT is to help Scoutmasters by training their top boy leaders in the skills of leadership.

NYLT is a National BSA-developed course that closely parallels the material provided in the 21st Century Wood Badge training for adults. Participants must be at least 13 years old, First Class or higher, have completed Troop Leadership Training, and have their Scoutmaster's or Venturing Crew Advisor's approval. Venturing and Explorer girls are also welcome in NYLT.

COMMISSIONERS' CORNER AN OPEN LETTER TO COMMISSIONERS



Let me introduce myself!

My name is J. David Enos and I am presently the Council Commissioner of our council. There are a lot of new things going on that have been downloaded from the National BSA that impact all commissioners in the BSA. I encourage each commissioner in this council to accept and act on these new ideas for the Commissioners Service. These new actions are part of our council's Journey To Excellence, and are required if our council want to become a high rated council. The Rio Grande Council needs our help.

The first step that commissioners should do is to make sure they are registered

as a commissioner. Yes, I know all of you are registered members of the Boy Scouts of America, but if you are not in procession of a card that says you are a commissioner, then as far as the council is concerned you are not one. This a very simple thing to correct, just fill out another BSA application stating your title as a commissioner. This will not cost any more money (since you are already registered in the BSA) and it is very important to do so as soon as possible.

The second step is for all registered commissioners to setup and account on "my.scouting.org". Please notice that my (dot) scouting is not the same as the pervious one (myscouting.org) just following rules given to register to this site. The new site is similar to the old one but is more detailed and includes all of the new Commissioner Tools. As always when dealing with BSA site your BSA ID number is very useful. The third and final step is to get your "feet wet" by evaluating a unit meeting and report it on my.scouting.org. I have no problem with you doing this to your own unit first, as long as you are consistent and follow the values of the Scout Oath and Law. I would like every commissioner to try to do these three things before we meet in September. Thank all of you for your unselfish service to our council!"

POPCORN

A good way to earn money for the unit is through Popcorn sales. The 30% of sales is a good incentive for units to sell popcorn, and Scouts can earn prizes based on the amount they sell. REMEMBERING AND HONORING RICHARD CALZADA



Many persons like to make a gift under their will to memorialize a loved one who was impacted by scouting or in honor of a special person or family member in their life.
