Its not everyday that you get to talk to an astronaut, but Scouts camping at Camp Perry did just that at 3:30PM on June 21st. Michael Fossum phoned Camp Perry from the International Space Station 220 miles above the earth specifically to talk to Scouts. Fossum, a McAllen native and Eagle Scout who attended Camp Perry when he was a Boy Scout, said that "Camp Perry is one of my favorite places on earth." Fossum arranged for the call because he wanted to encourage Scouts to set their goals and do their best, to follow

their passion in whatever it may be.

The Scouts only had a 15 minute window to speak to Fossum due to the position of the orbiting telecommunication satellites relaying the call. Fossum answered questions from eight Scouts. He described how the space station is powered by solar panels, how garbage is handled (packed up and returned to earth), and how experience as an Eagle Scout came in handy when he had to tie a clove hitch knot in space. Responding to a question on training to become an astronaut, Fossum said that if a boy wants to become an astronaut, his training begins when he signs up for the Boy Scouts. When asked how many astronauts are Eagle Scouts, Fossom said that about half of the men in the NASA program are Eagle Scouts. The boys and the adults present for the call were thrilled to be a part of a historical event.

Among those working to make the call possible were Doug Brady, Tom Ball, Chris Boswell, Valley Telephone Coop, Jay Meade, and Citrus Communications. The news media were well represented and many articles were spread through the United States.

Direct contact leaders are those who interact directly with Scouts, such as: Cub Master, Assistant Cub Master, Den Leader, Webelos Leader, Scout



Master, Assistant Scout Master, Venturing Crew Leader, and Assistant Crew Leader. Rank advancement badges are those for Wolf, Bear, Webelos, and all Scout ranks. Merit badges or other awards are not covered. Unit committee members are not considered direct contact leaders. Make sure that your unit takes advantage of this opportunity. Let's get everyone trained.

RIO GRANDE COUNCIL LEADS SOUTHERN REGION



The Rio Grande Council leads the BSA's Southern Region in top leaders trained. With 55.8% top leaders trained as of the end of June, we have the most direct contact leaders trained of any council in the southern region. We are shooting for 100%, because every Scout deserves a trained leader.

The council also leads the Southern Region in membership growth and reten-

tion. Membership has increased 12% over last year, and the Rio Grande Council also leads in retention with 54.8% of our youth retained in their units for another year of Scouting.

A bright spot in the region, the Rio Grande Council is showing positive results during a time when many councils nation wide are experiencing declining membership. Our council has had its own struggles over the last several years, but due to the dedication and hard work of many volunteers We are on the road back to where Scouting can be in the Valley.

BIG IMPROVEMENTS AT CAMP PERRY

All of camp's buildings have been repainted. The mess hall, lodge, trading post and office, health lodge, and the latrines have a new look thanks to the hard work of the camp ranger and volunteer helpers.



Thanks to the efforts of dedicated volunteers, Camp Perry has undergone big improvements for the 2011 summer camping season.

Camp Perry passed camp inspection with flying colors. The pool was resurfaced and the pool dressing room facilities were refitted with new plumbing, repainted, and spruced up. The water in the pool




Camp building have been fitted with signs so that new Scouts and visitors can know where they are. The kitchen area has been screened-in (fly proof), so no extra unwanted protein in camp food. Special metal covers have been installed in the mess hall so no more tripping on uneven floors. The camp water front has been upgraded with a new screen for shade.

A general cleaning has camp looking better than it has for years. Lots of

old junk has been hauled away making camp safer. The first paver bricks have been installed around the flag pole. The pavers are a way to recognize and honor Scouts, Scouters, and others who have supported Scouting and Camp Perry.



Wood Badge 2012



Wood Badge, sometimes referred to the "PH.D of Scout Training," is a leadership course that completes Scouting's Basic Leadership Training program for all levels of Scout leaders (Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Varsity Scouts, and Venturing).

Wood Badge is for the 21st Century Cub Scout, Boy Scout, Varsity Scout, and Venturing leaders as well as District and Council leaders. The course content and leadership principles introduced apply to all leadership positions in Scouting. These skills provide a common leadership foundation that is benefi-

cial for all of Scouting's program areas.

The next wood badge course is divided into 2 sessions, a total of 6 days: 1st Session--March, 2, 3, & 4 and 2nd Session--March 23, 24,& 25, 2012. Each session begins on a Friday morning at 8:00AM and ends on Sunday afternoon at approximately 5:00PM. All sessions will be conducted at Camp Perry.

Prerequisites:

- Be a registered member of BSA with a current Youth Protection Training certificate.
- Have completed Leader Specific Training for your registered position, and the required online training.
- Be capable of functioning safely in an outdoor environment. The BSA Health and Medical Record is required.

Mark your calendar and make your plans. Start gathering up your loose change towards the \$200 course fee for this Advanced Adult Leadership Training Opportunity.

EAGLE & CAMP PERRY STAFF GATHERING

They came from each end of the Valley and from throughout Texas to retrace footsteps and recall memories of that special place that made a lasting impact on their lives. Many of them were Eagle Scouts come home to roost for the evening while still others were members of that singular dream of every Scout, Camp Perry Staffers. While some of them brought their spouses, all of them brought their recollections of life at camp—Camp Perry, the site of the latest reunion of Eagle Scouts and Camp Perry Staffers was held on May 14th.



It turned out to be a cool, breezy evening for those 80+ people who gathered to talk to friends, retrace some of their footsteps, and look at the Rio Grande Council collection of Camp Perry, Wewanoma Lodge, and council shoulder strip patches. A collection of OA Area and Section meeting patches from the early 1950s was also displayed.

Retreat at the new flag pole and paver brick plaza included the traditional firing of the camp cannon as the colors were lowered for the day. Although the cannon's boom of past years came out as more of a "pop," it still brought back memories.

Leading the camp fire in the bowl was Pete Moore, a veteran camp staffer from 50 years ago. A cutting edge of technology, smokeless campfire won praises from all of the women in the audience. Half the crowd in the bowl stood up when Eagle Scouts were recognized. An equal number of people stood when parents of Eagle Scouts were asked to rise. Camp Staffers present included one from last year, and several from the 1940s, quite a span of years, but all with that common bond—Camp Perry. Stories of camp were related by Sammy Coats, Rayburn MacNelly, Bob Whalen, as well as Pete Moore. Tom Ball led songs just as he did when he was on camp staff.

The Rio Grande Council's high adventure base at South Padre Island is al-

ADULT LEADER TRAINING

Every Scout deserves a trained leader. Do you agree? The Rio Grande Council thinks so. The Executive Board passed a resolution in 2010 that all top leaders be "fully trained." The result is that 98% of the Top Leaders in the council are "fully trained," and we are working on the remaining leaders to get them trained.

The Executive Board passed the following resolution at it's last meeting: "That all direct contact unit leaders in Cub Scout Packs, Boy Scout Troops and Venturing Crews and Explorer Posts be fully trained." Direct contact leaders are Top Leaders such as Cub Masters, Scout Masters, Venture Crew Leaders and Explorer Post Advisors, and all assistant leaders such as Assistant Cub Masters, Cub Den Leaders, Webelos Leaders, Assistant Scout Masters, and Assistant Venture Crew and Explorer Post Leaders.

The resolution continues: "Furthermore, we resolve that new direct contact unit leaders in new units be "fully trained" in their specific positions prior to their applications being processed. The only exception

will be Boy Scout Leaders and Venturing Leaders that require specific and outdoor courses. These individuals must complete all online courses including youth protection training before their applications are to be processed."

Trained leaders result in better program for Scouts. Better program leads to more advancement. More advancement leads to better retention in Scouting. Trained leaders are key in the mission of the BSA: "to prepare young people to make ethical and moral choices throughout their lives by instilling in them the values of the Scout Oath and Law."
